Insights & Analysis

- The political environment in WA-04 is favorable to Republicans with an R+21 advantage on the generic ballot (57 36), including a slight edge with Independents (43 42), who make up about a quarter of likely voters. Donald Trump (53 fav 43 unfav) is in a decent place overall, but drastically underperforms among Independents (40 fav 58 unfav).
 - Still, most voters are willing to vote for Trump on the presidential ballot (Trump 57 Harris 39), despite personally unfavorable feelings towards him in many cases, especially among Independents who only narrowly lean Harris (49 46).
 - Raul Garcia struggles similarly with Independents (Cantwell 46 Garcia 39), but ultimately leads by a wide margin overall on the U.S. Senate ballot (Garcia 52 – Cantwell 36).
- Dan Newhouse (35 fav 48 unfav) has a struggling image with voters across the political spectrum. 55% of Republicans view him unfavorably compared to just a third who are favorable. Newhouse is also underwater with Independents (37 43) and Democrats (37 40) but does better than Sessler.
 - Jerrod Sessler (40 fav 27 unfav) has an incredible +59 net favorability among Republicans (66 7), but is -11 among Independents (27 38), and -41 with Democrats (9 50).
- All this brings us to the initial ballot (Sessler 44 Newhouse 34 Undecided 22) with Sessler leading by 10 points. It won't be easy, but there are several promising data points for Newhouse:
 - Newhouse holds a 13-point advantage with Independents (46 33). If the 21% of undecided Independents continue on a similar track, this lead will only grow.
 - 38% of Democrats who are undecided. They will break overwhelmingly for Newhouse, but the trick will be getting them to vote at all, and indicating to them that failing to vote for Newhouse is a vote for everything they hate ("MAGA").
 - Sessler currently leads with Republicans (73 18), the likely floor for Newhouse from which he can only improve.



Insights & Analysis – Cont.

- 79% of voters recall seeing, reading, and hearing (SRH) about Newhouse, primarily via TV (35%), social media (30%), and in the mail (29%). Voters tend to recall positive information about Newhouse (40 positive 16 negative 35 even mix).
 - Fewer voters are SRH'ing about Sessler (64%), but the information flow about him is more positive than Newhouse (51 pos 18 neg 20 even mix) with less negative information.
- Messaging improves the picture for Newhouse, bringing him to within a point of Sessler on the informed ballot (40 – 39) with 21% of voters undecided. Newhouse picks up 5 points, mostly from Sessler, who drops 4 points.
 - The best message **overall** is *Innovation*, focused on American energy innovation.
 - For **Republicans**, the best message is also *Innovation*, followed closely by *American Industry*, promising a restoration of American leadership in industry.
 - For Independents, American Industry is most effective, followed closely by Innovation.
 - For **Democrats**, the best message by far is *Innovation*, with the others being ineffective.
- This will require two campaigns one aimed at consolidating Republicans, and one aimed at building the best coalition of Independents and Democrats.
 - Newhouse must consolidate the portion of Republicans who are more center-right on the ideological spectrum. Anything we can peel off from Sessler here makes the race more and more winnable. The difference between losing Republicans 80-20 and losing them 70-30 is the difference between victory and defeat. We need to appeal to Republicans with the issues they care most about; inflation and illegal immigration.
 - We also need an entirely separate campaign to build the best coalition of Independents and Democrats. Democrats need to be made aware of the power they hold in this race.



Insights & Analysis – Cont.

- Climate change is an important issue for voters (55% important 43% not important). A third of voters say the issue is *very* important to them personally. However, there is clear partisan break with Democrats being the most likely to say important (96 4), followed by Independents (55 40), with Republicans overwhelmingly thinking it's not important (31 67).
- Furthermore, while 48% of Democrats say clean energy issues are among the top issues they consider, only 19% of Independents and 10% of Republicans say the same. 46% of Republicans say it is an issue they don't consider much if at all.
- 67% of voters say they have seen an increase in home energy prices while 24% say their bill has stayed the same. Only 4% of voters say there bill has gone down.
- 69% of voters support protecting the Snake River Dam from federal legislation in order to keep it intact (11% oppose). Majorities of Republicans, Democrats, and Independents support protecting the dam.
- Voters tend to prefer a market-led approach to energy (53%) to a government-led approach (23%), especially Republicans (70 9) and Independents (53 27). Democrats are much more split but tend to prefer the government-led approach (28 40).
- 80% of voters say it is important for the U.S. to become energy independent, including over three-quarters of Republicans, Democrats, and Independents. 60% of voters overall say it is very important to become energy independent.



Insights & Analysis – Segmentation Analysis

- Segmentation analysis identified three groups via machine-learning:
 - GOP Lean Newhouse (25%) are the Republicans Newhouse needs to go after to shave as much GOP support from Sessler's lead as possible. These tend to be Republicans who view Newhouse favorably but have not yet heard much about Sessler. They skew more female and tend to be younger (<55) than the Sessler Supporters segment and are more moderate ideologically. They tend to be more rural than the predominately suburban Sessler Supporters segment.
 - **Democrat Lean Newhouse** (40%) are the key to the other prong of the approach. These are Democrats who hate everything MAGA and view Sessler unfavorably while having a mixed view of Newhouse. The key is motivating them to actually vote with messages on the environment and the *Innovation* message.
 - **Sessler Supporters** (35%) are more hardcore Republicans who view Donald Trump very favorably. They're all-in on Sessler and tend to view Newhouse unfavorably. This relatively slim coalition of staunch Republicans can be outmaneuvered by joint coalitions of more moderate Republicans and anti-MAGA Democrats.

Newhouse Messages



Newhouse Lower Prices: Dan Newhouse will rapidly expand energy production by removing regulations.
